Why Recycle Electronics?

Electronic products often contain hazardous and toxic materials that pose environmental risks if they are landfilled or incinerated.

- Traditional televisions and computer monitors use cathode ray tubes (CRTs), which have significant amounts of lead.
- Flat screen TVs and monitors contain mercury.
- Printed circuit boards contain primarily plastic and copper, and most have small amounts of chromium, lead solder, nickel, and zinc.
- The batteries that power many electronic products often contain nickel, cadmium, and other heavy metals.
- Relays and switches in electronics, especially older ones, may contain mercury.

Ways to Reduce Electronic Waste

The next time you are considering the purchase of a new electronic device, consider these tips:

- **Avoid "gadgets."** Electronic versions of traditional household appliances and tools may not actually be an improvement, may be more costly, and may wear out faster.
- **Select durable products.** When shopping for electronic and electrical items, review the product's repair history and consumer reliability ratings.
- **Repair instead of replace.** It may be cheaper than replacing it.
- **Upgrade your existing gear.** Some products can be upgraded by replacing a single component instead of the entire unit. This saves money and reduces waste.
- **Lease equipment.** When it's time to upgrade to a newer product, the user returns the old unit to the vendor, often for a credit toward a future purchase. When acquiring new computer equipment, ask and learn about lease options.
